# From the Chairman

## Dear Residents,

I am writing as the country starts to ease some of the restrictions that we have all had to live through for the past 15 weeks or so. As with every part of society, local government has had to deal with challenges that we have never seen before.

Although the Parish Office has been closed during this pandemic, we have continued to carry out all our routine work around the village. We have also seen the temporary closure of all our facilities, which has meant that the regular groups that use them have been unable to meet.

We are currently in the process of undertaking the necessary risk assessments and looking at the necessary control measures that are needed to enable the reopening of the Heritage Centre and Village Hall, to allow groups to start to return. Like everywhere, there will be some changes in how we use the spaces, to reduce the risk of transmission for our users. As soon as the government permits the reopening of community buildings, we will be ready.

The pandemic led to a number of changes in the law that regulates local government. For the first time in history, councils are now permitted to hold on-line meetings - using technology to achieve this. We have now held council meetings this way, so that business can carry on. Another of the changes removed the statutory requirement to hold annual town and parish meetings in 2020, so we have taken the decision to defer these to next year.

As one of your district councillors, I would like to let you know how the pandemic has affected Sevenoaks District Council. One of the most significant impacts has been with the huge increase in volumes of domestic waste while many more of us than usual have stayed at home. Our refuse teams have been under increased pressure during this period, but we are proud to have still maintained our weekly collections.

On top of all the regular services provided, the district council immediately stepped in within the first week of the pandemic to design, set up and implement a volunteer scheme to serve the most vulnerable residents in our community. For some of the residents who are shielding, Sevenoaks District Council has coordinated the distribution of regular food parcels to over 500 homes, utilising many local volunteers, and reassigning the work of the district council officers. The government's business support package, that has been widely publicised, has been administered locally across the UK by local authorities. Sevenoaks District Council has issued more than 1800 grants, totalling more than £22million, with a further 180 business applications to the discretionary business fund, for the smallest businesses. All this additional work has been carried out with most of the officers working from home.

It seems such a long time ago, but as recently as 14th March, just a week before the Prime Minister announced the lock down, we held our event to mark the 75th anniversary, to the day, of the V2 rocket which fell in Hextable. It was great to see so many residents turn out, to be present for the unveiling of the blue plaque on

the Chemist, and then to attend the dedication of the memorial garden in the land at the bottom of the Broomhill Bank school site. I am pleased to announce that the transfer of this piece of land, to form the memorial garden for

Hextable, is progressing and I look forward to us being able to start to clear and prepare the space for everyone to enjoy.

### **Sharon Mitchell 1959 - 2020**

It is with much sadness that I have to share the news of the passing of Mrs Sharon Mitchell, Chairman of Hextable Heritage Society in March this year. In my role as Chairman of the Parish Council, and member of the Heritage Society since 2003, I have had the pleasure to know and work with Sharon for a number of years.

Sharon was a great supporter of the heritage of our village, but also much wider in the Dartford area.

She became a member of Dartford District Archaeological Group in 1973, and took the role of producing the newsletter for many of these years. She was also a member of the Kent Archaeological Society, before joining the Hextable Heritage Society around 13 years ago, and soon after, becoming chairperson.

Sharon's enthusiasm and attentive research brought our local history to life. Most recently, I had the pleasure of working with her and Revd Johnny Douglas, to jointly host the 75th anniversary event, which marked the V2 rocket that landed in the village on 14th March 1945. This was a perfect example of how Sharon would look for opportunities to promote our shared history.

During her tenure as chair of the Heritage Society, she dealt with many enquiries from people who were interested in the Hextable's rich history. Sharon would always personally respond to help them, and make time to meet them and help with their research. Many of these involved enquires associated with the former Horticultural College, which she had a passionate interest in - including former students or family members, some from outside the UK. Sharon had a great affection for our local history, and shared a great deal of knowledge. She will be greatly missed.

One of the unexpected side effects of Covid-19 has been our struggle to accept a lack of control. We are so used to being, if not masters of our own fate, at least able to make the choices that influence it and having this removed by the virus and the government's efforts to control it has been a steep and uncomfortable learning curve. These months have asked so very many different things for each of us. While some have retreated and some have settled into a 'holding position', others have faced the problem head-on and chosen to do what they can, however small, rather than do nothing at all. It is in this way that the extraordinary has been achieved; the small good deeds that have resulted in an enormous effort to feed, support and protect the vulnerable and needy of our local community.

Meeting so very many more of you on your doorsteps has been a substantial gift. That old paradox, that it's more blessed to give than to receive! In the 12 weeks of Covid-19, a core team of 11 key volunteers with many other offers of help have been at the core of the response, offering over 1700 hours of compassionate help in our geographic parish of Hextable & Swanley Villages: that's a 100% response rate based on SDC, HPC and many direct requests to myself as your community vicar! This represents so very much compassionate help in our geographic parish of Hextable & Swanley Villages. £1,410 of gifted Asda supermarket vouchers to benefit 61 households being made possible by the generosity of the church, local residents and a £300 gift from the Chairman's Fund, at Hextable Parish Council.

The media would have us believe that society is becoming increasingly self-serving and insular and that most of us don't know the names of our next-door neighbours, but COVID19 has disproved this. Streets coming alive and not just on Thursday evenings, and beyond VE Day celebrations. The acts of kindness performed daily by volunteers, friends and neighbours, whether shopping, knitting hearts or a phone call to the lonely, show that we are not just a collection of houses but have increasingly experienced more and more community cohesion. A person's true character is often revealed in time of crisis. Thank you for your part in these times. I am so very glad to say that Hextable is my parish and my home. Should there be ways that we can serve you and your household, do just ask...

# The New Normal

We may just be coming out of lockdown, but the period since the end of March has meant untold changes for our local businesses. Some were forced to close their doors completely, and others had to keep their doors open, whilst trying to minimise the risks to both their staff and customers.

We wanted to highlight how some of our local businesses have adapted to the 'new normal', so that you can see how lockdown has affected them, and the changes they have made to keep us, and their staff safe. First up, AK Barbers and AK Colours & Curls:

I was invited by Kevin Reid to visit AK Barbers and Colours & Curls, and I was blown away by the thought and effort they have put into making both salons safe for everyone! They had to close on 23rd March, but they have put this time to good use, making the changes necessary to enable them to reopen on 4th July.

They have built individual stations for each stylist, so that each stylist

and customer are completely separate from others. There are hand sanitisers throughout both salons, and they have invested in hundreds of gowns, as each one will have to be deep cleaned after every customer before it can be reused. Each booth has steam cleaners so that they can be thoroughly cleaned after each customer, and Kevin explained how all equipment will be sanitised after every use. All stylists will be wearing masks, visors and gloves, and customers are requested to wear masks as well.

Colours & Curls are operating on an appointment basis only, but as the barbers accepts 'walk-in' customers, they have devised an ingenious waiting area, with plastic curtains separating each customer, and a ticket system so that customers don't need to leave the waiting area until their number is called. Both salons will be taking contact details for every client, so that they can be contacted under the 'track & trace' scheme.

### Club K

The pandemic has been a time for change and growth at Club-K. Within a week of the physical business being shut down we had shifted the vast majority of our classes online and were streaming the classes live via Facebook. We followed this by creating [www.club-k.online](http://www.club-k.online); an online platform with all the classes we have in club, and many more available to stream at home anytime you like.

Currently, we have over 20 classes from relaxation and meditation though to high impact Tabata classes, with more being added regularly.

With the restrictions easing, we have put in a large gazebo in the back garden which has allowed us to work outside with some protection from the ever-changeable British weather. This has allowed us back to work with GP referral patients, exercise therapy for pain, as well as personal training. To add to this, as the lockdown level has changed, we can now have up to five people in a class outside.

Now we work as a hybrid club, seeing people both physically and remotely, with people doing classes from as far away as Scotland and New Zealand. Where we would once have been hands-on with sports massage, and until we can be again, we are now online, using exercise and Pilates therapy combined with self-myofascial release, to help with muscular pain and soreness.

As a small store, we initially found it very difficult to adhere to the social distancing rules, as we had a very limited number of staff members who were able or willing to work. Most of my staff were either shielding or had fears that they could be in danger. To make the store safer for customers and staff, we installed plastic screens at the till points and set up a one way route throughout the store, to help prevent customers from bumping into each other, and we also set up hand sanitising stations.

Our newspaper home deliveries dramatically increased, to a point where we struggled to cope with the volume of orders.

We changed our opening hours to help customers and colleagues alike. Unfortunately, we had to close our store at delivery times, due to only having one member of staff available.

Luckily, things have gradually improved as customers became used to the new layout.

## Hextable Pharmacy

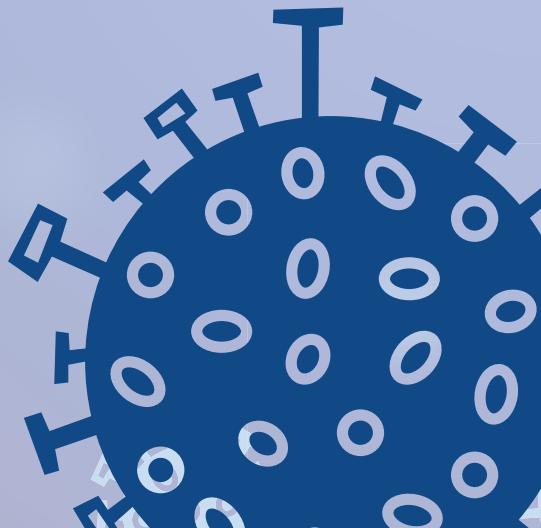
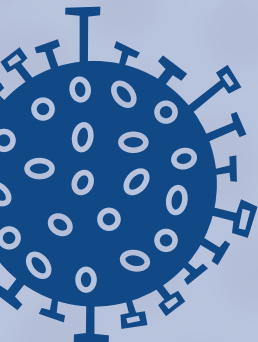
During the pandemic, the village pharmacy has remained open all the time. We have carried on providing a full service, under some very difficult and worrying conditions.

## Home Hill Garage

When I was asked to write a piece about Covid and the effects on my garage, I had so many different emotions.

At first it was fear and panic that I was going to lose my business, and that my four loyal staff would lose their jobs. We were going into the unknown, which I had no control over whatsoever; nothing I had experienced in the last 30 years at Home Hill Garage. But on the other hand, I must admit that when lockdown came I soon slipped into relaxation mode and cracked on with all those jobs that needed doing around the house and in the garden (see photo). But it turned out to be the longest and most expensive holiday I have ever had.

We were then told garages were an essential service and we could open, although everyone's MOT had been extended and so we really didn't have a lot of work to return to. We installed 'sneeze screens' and made sure that we had bottles of hand sanitizer on the counter. We restricted the reception so that there is only one person in there at a time, which is working well, and had each member of staff work in their own individual



workshop. When we eventually re-opened, I was pleasantly surprised by how many people were still having their cars MOT'd, and as people have slowly started returning to work and using their cars again, business is slowly gaining momentum. I must add that without the Government grant and furlough scheme, I think Home Hill Garage may have been not such a happy place to work.

I would also like to thank 99% of my customers who understand what social distancing means and here's hoping the new normal is a bit brighter than some are painting it.

The cubs have been busy, too!

Since lockdown began, we have held weekly meetings via Zoom. Four new Cubs have joined with one invested so far.

Programmes have included escape rooms, magic demo and teaching, face mask making, tackling food waste, games, secret codes, map reading and a virtual camp with camp-related challenges. Many Cubs have slept overnight in home made dens: some of them for over a week's worth of nights and we held a meeting with another pack.

Not all of our Cubs have the technology to join Zoom meetings, but that does not stop those Cubs knowing what we are doing, working for and gaining badges. 30 different badges have been earned, 104 total, including Photographer, Skater, Home Help, Collector, Environmental Conservation, Gardener, Animal Carer and Community Impact. Earned badges are regularly delivered to the Cubs.

Some have already gained the new Scouts Great Indoors and Mayhem badges and we devised our own badge for the period: for this the Cubs are doing a specific good turn every week. These have included writing letters to the residents of Emersons, making Easter cards and baked goods for lonely neighbours, donating gifts to patients at Darent Valley hospital, joining the Crisis homelessness challenge and a litter pick.

18 Cubs and Leaders raised money for Children In Need by participating in the national Scouts Hike to the Moon endeavour, where over 700,000 miles were walked by Scouts in the UK.

Hamza has achieved the highest Cubs award, the Chief Scout's Silver Award, and Daisy the Kent Invicta Award, for taking part in a variety of activities outside the group setting. Daisy is featured on Kent Scouts Good News page for baking treats each week and giving them to isolated people, but many of the other Cubs have also been doing great things in the community.

# White Oak Leisure Centre Update

Work on the new site commenced on 26th May and is progressing well. The site hoarding is up, and the compound has been established. An accessible ramp and walkways to the existing centre have been created. Sewer diversion work is underway, and we expect piling to commence on 10th July. In the meantime, archaeological investigations are being carried out. The closure of the existing centre, due to the lockdown, has meant it the asbestos survey could be undertaken without any inconvenience to users. The building works mean that parking space

will unfortunately be reduced during the construction of the new centre.

The government has now announced the opening of the leisure sector from 25th July. Preparatory work for the reopening is currently underway to meet this date and we are pleased to be able to announce that it is expected that the White Oak Centre will be able to welcome members and visitors from this date.

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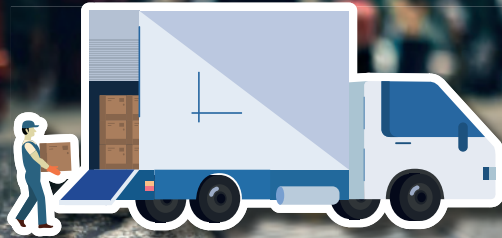
